'Son,' the man said, 'don't you realize there are miles and miles of beach and hundreds of starfish? You can't make a difference!' APES Students Introduce Share Tables

It's the New Year and time to make New Year's resolutions, and while many may try to limit the amount of food they consume, it is important to think of a New Year's resolution for our community.

World hunger is an issue that is given a lot of attention but is often associated with regions outside of our county, however, it is a problem many people face daily, people we know. In fact, slightly less than half of students at Glenbard East are on free or reduced lunch, making them heavily reliant on the school for providing meals. The APES students of Glenbard East (AP Environmental Science) recognize this issue and would like to bring it to light in our community. With the introduction of share tables at Glenbard East, we are not only helping to reduce landfill waste and benefit the environment, but we are also making a strong effort to end hunger in our own community. And although the holiday season is over, the season of giving never is.

Through cumulative data, we (the APES students of GBE) have discovered an excessive amount of food in our trash. Food does not belong in a landfill, it is easily compostable, but more importantly it is edible. We

found that many of the food items that students discard are unopened and/or easily shareable items such as chips, yogurt, juice, and even fruits like apples and bananas, and as a result too many students go hungry. These students make trips throughout their school day to the nurse with complaints of hunger pain symptoms. Not only is malnutrition bad for a student's health, but these constant trips to the nurse's office take away from a student's education. The students of Glenbard East have devised a solution: share tables. "Share tables" are carts on which students can place their unwanted food, this means any sealed and packaged items such as juice boxes, granola bars, yogurts, and chips. Items such as apples, bananas and oranges are also acceptable. (However items brought from home, like a bag of carrots or a sandwich, are not acceptable.) By doing so, we will be reducing the amount of edible food that Glenbard East throws away. APES students will be pushing around the share tables during lunch periods and fellow students can give their unwanted items, as well as take items. At the end of the lunch pe-

riod, APES students will deliver the unwanted items to the nurses office, readily available for hungry students in need.

Community is and always has been a very big part of what Glenbard East represents. From our music program to the sports in the end we are all one big family. So now it is our time to give back to the school that has given us so much. We want to make sure that every kid has the opportunity to eat nutritious food in order to stay healthy and concentrate for our recent kickoff of second semester. School is where we and our fellow classmates go to get educated, and we are lucky enough to have a great set of staff to teach us, so we should be worried about our education, not what we are eating throughout the day.

Overall many problems exist in today's world and it's impossible to solve all of them overnight. However, through the efforts of Glenbard East's APES students we can begin to make a dent in the ones that exist in our school: hunger and food waste. Through the efforts of the share tables, we hope to inspire Glenbard East to start focusing on the small problems in order to improve our community and the world.

Although romantic love is important, sometimes it's not all about heart eyes and boxes of chocolates. Sometimes, it's just about showing people that they're appreciated.




Justice for Brown

In the beginning of January 2019, the governor of Tennessee granted Cyntoia Brown (age 30) clemency. Ms. Brown was convicted of first-degree murder at the age of 16, she allegedly killed her "client" Johnny Mitchell Allen in an act of self defense. She was arrested and tried as an adult by the juvenile court judge Betty Adams Green, even though she was a minor at the time. After serving almost 15 years, state lawmakers are writing a new "legislation that would give others like her a quicker road to a second chance(The New York Times)." Ms. Brown isn't the only person who was minor that was charged as an adult, "at least 148 inmates in Tennessee are serving life sentences without the possibility of parole for 51 years for crimes they committed as juveniles, according to figures from the state's department of correction. Some were as young as 14 when they committed their offenses(The New York Times)."

The characters are diverse in their struggles. Leo is biracial and is looked down upon by others; Jetta grapples with bipolar disorder. Heilig also weaves in little snippets of things like songs, folk stories, poems, telegrams, maps and posters. Occasionally, chapters dealing with certain groups of characters will be written in play format. It's these little quirks that make *For a Muse of Fire* so fun to read. However, while I enjoyed much of the book, it was a lengthy and slightly difficult read. Being the first of a trilogy, much of the facts and basics of the fantasy world are front loaded from the get-go. For this reason, it took me a while to get names and places straight. The book is also around 500 pages long, slightly longer than what some consider a "quick read". Luckily, the addition of songs and chapters in play format help break it up. But after getting all the facts straight, the book was really enjoyable - and definitely worth another two books. To conclude, I was absolutely enchanted by "For a Muse of Fire" and I recommend this book to anyone looking for a good fantasy. And while reading it requires some dedication from the reader, it is absolutely worth it.
